SPEAKER: Alexander Zwissler, CEO of the Chabot Space & Science Center in Oakland, a non-profit celebrating 125 years of providing inspirational science education to the community. Today annually over 50,000 students and over 2,000 teachers are served and trained at the Center.



Alex reported that only about 46% of 5th graders are proficient in Science in the Bay Area. Statewide, about 24.2% drop out of Science. California is the second lowest state in science scores for 4th graders. Reasons include: • Lack of focus on Science priority • No Child left behind • Limited resources, and • Efforts to improve have not worked. He sees an impact to the following: • Untrained workforce, • Global competition, and • Future challenges will need scientific solutions.

- Galaxy Explorers Program for 200 High School students
- Micronauts Program for over 1,500 K-3 students
- Challenger Learning Center
