SPEAKER: The speaker was Mike Elder, the Northern California Coordinator for the California Highway Patrol 11-99 Foundation. He was assisted by Mitchell Mueller, the Dublin Area Commander for the CHP.

11-99 is the dispatcher's code for "Officer needs assistance."

The California Highway Patrol 11-99 Foundation was founded by visionary civic leader Bob Weinberg. In 1981, Bob became aware of a CHP family facing a grave financial crisis brought on by the prolonged illness of their child, and mounting bills not covered by benefits. When he discovered that there was no organized community support for CHP families in times of crisis, he founded the California Highway Patrol 11-99 Foundation. Today, thousands of caring and concerned people from all walks of life are donors to the CHP 11-99 Foundation. The donations made to the CHP 11-99 Foundation are directly applied to providing financial assistance to CHP families in need. The Foundation's beneficiaries serve as living testaments to the very real difference the contributions our donors and supporters make.



Today, after a quarter century of service to CHP families, the Foundation has grown to provide upwards of \$2.5 million annually in the form of Emergency and Death Benefits and post-secondary level educational Scholarships. Since the CHP 11-99 Foundation was formed, the members of the Foundation's Board of Directors have provided \$16.6 million in program support to California Highway Patrol employees and eligible family members.

The donations made and the kindness, dedication, and love shared by supporters, touch and improve the lives of hundreds of thousands of Californians each year. The California Highway Patrol 11-99 Foundation is an IRS-recognized 501(c)(3) nonprofit, charitable organization.

AROUND THE ROTARY WORLD

Pakistanis train for future In 2008, 135 women and girls attended classes at a vocational training center established by the Rotary Club of Farooqabad, Punjab, Pakistan, which was chartered earlier that year. Two instructors at the three room center offer a six-month course that teaches students to sew garments, including traditional saris. The center also provides training in handicrafts and computer software and hardware.

Drama for Bulgarian orphans In December, the Rotary Club of Sofia-International, Bulgaria, organized a theater outing for 115 children, ages 3 to 16, living in orphanages. Sponsors for the second annual event included McDonald's, Coca-Cola, Nestlé, and Hallmark Tickets. The club also organized a clothing, book, and toy drive for the children, which included items collected by students from three area schools.

TAKING THE PENNANT

One of the more colorful traditions of Rotary is the exchange of club banners. Rotarians traveling to distant locations often take banners to exchange at make-up meetings as a token of friendship. Many clubs use the decorative banners they have received for attractive displays at club meetings and district events.

By 1959, exchanging banners had become so popular that the RI Board of Directors was concerned the practice would be a financial burden on clubs. It urged Rotarians to "exercise discretion, moderation, and measured judgment in making provision for such exchanges."

The approximately 20,000 banners in the Rotary History and Archives collection reflect clubs' hometown pride and their connection with the international organization.

In addition to incorporating the Rotary emblem, banners often include symbols or imagery of a club's town, region, or country. Others represent local craftsmanship or cultural traditions by displaying leatherwork, weaving, embroidery, or hand-painted designs.
